Christmas Jumper Day 2025

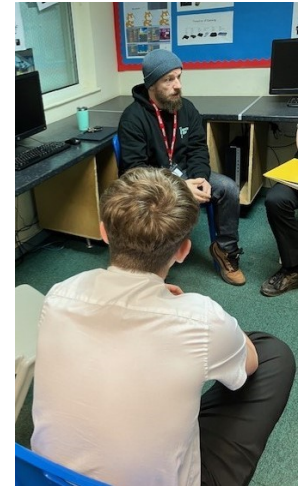

Each student has 45 minutes to tackle a series of interactive tasks, designed to encourage logical thinking and problem-solving skills appropriate for their age group.

Below is an example of a type of question the students faced – how would you have got on?

Bain the Beaver has a magical tree growing near their home.

Whenever a bird lands on it (🐦), the tree grows 2 apples.


Whenever a squirrel climbs up it (🐿), the tree drops 1 apple (if it has any).

Whenever a snake visits the tree (🐍), all of the apples instantly disappear!

One morning Bain notes that the magical tree contains 25 apples.

Bain then spends the rest of the day drawing pictures of all the animals that come to the tree.

The drawings, in order, are:



Start of the day End of the day

Question
How many apples are on the tree at the end of the day?

3 7 17 31

Answer

The answer is that there are 7 apples on the tree at the end of the day.

Since all of the apples instantly disappear whenever a snake visits the tree, we can ignore everything that happens before the arrival of a snake.

After the last snake, four birds land on the tree which means the tree will sprout $4 \times 2 = 8$ apples.

Then one squirrel climbs up the tree which causes one apple to drop, leaving $8 - 1 = 7$ apples

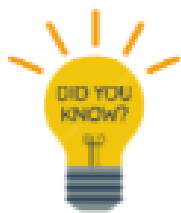





Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Reporting an Absence

Parents are expected to inform us of their child's absence before 9.00 a.m. on each day of absence providing the reason for absence. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness. If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy. In addition, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if your child is absent from College due to illness.

Lateness

The school day (first registration session) starts at 8.50 am, all students are expected to be in their classroom at this time.

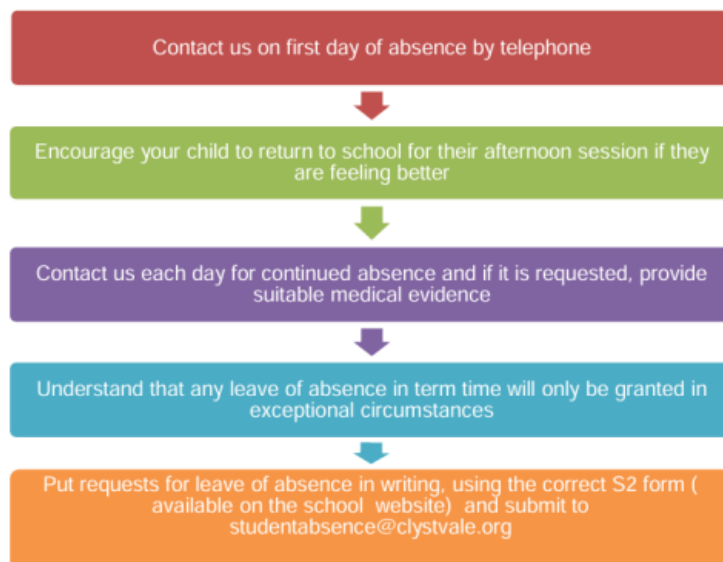
Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. We ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment if they can.

Please give the school as much notice as possible, at least two weeks' notice is useful.

If the appointment requires the pupil to leave during the day, they must be signed out by an adult listed on the student's record at the main reception.

PROFESSIONAL DIVER

Professional divers are responsible for performing a variety of tasks underwater, often in challenging and hazardous conditions. Their duties may include underwater construction, maintenance, and environmental surveys. They may also be involved in underwater photography or videography, scientific research, or marine archaeology.

Professional divers must follow strict rules to stay safe underwater. There are protocols in place to avoid risks posed by pressure, decompression sickness, and dangerous marine environments.

Commercial divers, who are involved in industries like oil and gas, underwater construction, or salvage, often earn the highest salaries. Entry-level commercial divers can expect to earn around £20,000 to £30,000 per year. Experienced divers working offshore or in specialised roles, such as saturation diving, can earn upwards of £50,000 to £100,000 annually, with some high-risk jobs offering even higher pay.

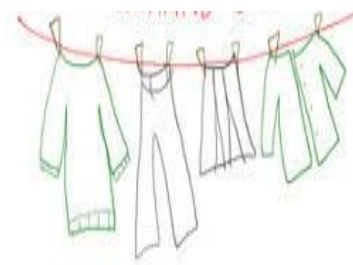
